Session 6 COLLEGE 102: RESEARCHING COLLEGES

Coach Overview

Every student wants to find the best college for them, but some students have a hard time finding the perfect match. In this session, mentors are given the opportunity to explore a variety of colleges and then work in teams to do some "college recruitment."

Session Goals

- Mentors learn about different colleges and postsecondary education options.
- Mentors consider possible colleges to attend based on their interests and goals.
- Mentors discover the importance of finding the right college match.
- Mentors present information to peers to foster a college-going culture.

Timeframe

Coach: 30 minutes coaching of Lead Mentors prior to each club meeting; ttend all meetings Mentors: at least 5 hours to complete entire session (see club age. da)

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Session At-a-Glance

What's in Your College Cap? – Mentors input their ideas for a perfect college campus.

Which Type of College? – Mentors learn about four different college systems (community, state, university, independent/private) and other school options (vocational, technical, trade).

Come to College! – Teams of mentors research online to complete a factsheet about a chosin college; then role-play college recruiters competing to convince peers to go to that college.

More College Options – Mentors explore and share more factors to consider when finding the best college match (e.g., social-emotional factors, living environment, studying abroad).

My College Future – Mentors complete a questionnaire about their future college plans.

Getting Started

- 1. Print copies of the club agenda, session instructional pages, and handouts for the Lead Mentors. Briefly meet with them prior to each club meeting (at least two days in advance to review what to do, answer questions, help them plan, and check progress.
- 2. Provide advice for managing group activities, posting question, to he p Lead Mentors consider possible ways to resolve problems and conflicts. For example:
- How might you help teams nanege their Can not Facts research?

 (Possible ideas: rotate roles within each team, such a website reader, notetaker, decision-maker; equally distribute tasks)
- How do you plan on ching the More College Options activities so everyone has fun? (Give Lead Mentors the first billity of modifying and personalizing activities to best meet club interests.)
- 3. For the Whic Type of College discussion topic that you will help facilitate, consider your own reasons for choosing your alma mater and share your stray with the club.
- 4. For the Const to College activity, give mentors plenty of leeway for creativity and fun. Be sure that all mentors partake in the research and role-paying including Lead Mentors.
- 5. Help Lead Mentors it ok for ways to utilize the club coordinators, such as:
- Have the Campus Culture Coordinator(s) make arrangements for mentors to do the Come to College recruiting activity in front of classes or during lunchtime in the guad.
- Have the Guest Coordinator(s) help arrange for actual college recruiters to visit.
- Have the Campus Liaison, Media, and PR Coordinators do their part too.

Warm Up WHAT'S IN YOUR COLLEGE CAP?

Bring a college cap or baseball cap to this warm up event, where mentors will drop in specific characteristics they would like to see in a college.

- 1. Give each mentor some strips of paper and a pencil.
- 2. Ask them to write the characteristics they would like to see in a college, but with this little catchible cannot write about the size, location, distance, major, or population.
- 3. To encourage free thinking, tell mentors that their responses should be anonymous, and their ideas don't have to be normal everyday responses.
- 4. Have them write each idea on a different strip of paper and then toss it into the an Don't forge to throw some in yourself.)
- 5. After everyone has put their thoughts into the cap, read them aloud so everyone hears the range of ideas regarding college.

Point out to mentors that everyone has specific things they look for it, a college. Today they will start exploring colleges, thinking about what colleges they is ally want to see in a campus, and deciding which colleges they like best.



Discussion Topic WHICH TYPE OF COLLEGE?

What do you know about these four college categories? Have everyone share their thoughts. Then talk about the following facts with the group.

Community College

Community colleges, sometimes called city colleges, are two-year public schools that accept modest idents, including those with lower grades, and offer many different programs that lead to an associate degree or certificate. They also prepare students who transfer to a four-year school. Costs for attending community college are usually low, often less than \$3,000 per year for tuition and fees.

State College

State colleges are four-year public schools in which you can earn a bachelor, degree, which it more dvanced than an associate degree from a community college. State colleges offer, unide selection of subject areas (majors) that you can choose for your degree. Some state colleges also offer gradius e programs, beyond four years, that lead to a master's or doctoral degree. Costs for attending state college are more than for community college.

University

A university is a collection of colleges on one campus, e.ch., roviding degrees for a specific area of study, such as for law or engineering. Like state colleges, universities of at four-year of chelo.'s degrees, and all offer master's and doctoral degrees. They are larger than state colleges and offer more advanced education and specialized programs. In general, it's tougher to get into a university, with fewer and more of applicants accepted. Universities have higher admission requirements as well as higher costs for attending school. But getting a degree from a university usually makes it easier to get well paying jobs and a successful career. In general, the higher your degree, the more money you will earn.

Independent College or University

Independent colleges and universities are private schools and separate institutes of higher education that often have very specific admission requirements and much higher costs than public colleges and universities. Among independent schools are the prestigious by League universities including Stanford, Harvard, and Yale.

Other School Options:

Other school options include gring to a job-training school (such as a trade school, coreer school, vocational school, or technical school) that teacnes specific skills for one particular type of job (e.g., car mechanic, dental assistant). Upon completion of the program, you usually need to get a certification or license for that job.



Activity COME TO COLLEGE!

In this activity, mentors become college recruiters, competing in teams to convince others in the club to go to their particular school. May the best recruiter win!

Choose a School

Give each team a Campus Facts sheet for one of the college categories on the next few pages (co., m unity college, state college, university, independent school), and have them pick one school from a list of sono. Is that you provide.

Possible websites you could use to create the list: www.californiacolleges.edu (CA colleges), http://www.utexas.edu/world/univ (all U.S. colleges), the state department of education web ites.

Gather Facts

Have each team work together to find facts about their school, using the called website and an, other available resources (e.g., college videos, brochures). You might also give teams the option of deciding an their own which facts to include instead of filling in their Campus Facts sheet. Set a lime lin it to gather facts.

Plan Your Pitch

It's time for teams to be clever and creative! Give teams a few minutes to play, their strategy for convincing other mentors to go to their school.

Recruit Others

Let the competition begin! Have team, take a irns convincing others to go to their school. You could also have them debate or answer audience questions

Then have everyone "submit an optication" to the school they want to attend the most (write the name of that school on a strip of paper), excluding their own school. Tally the results and announce the winner!

College Preferences

- 1. Copy the More College Options lists (School Type, Location, Environment, Student Body, Camr us, Academics, Extra Activities) from the following page onto separate sheets of chart paper, and post them Cothe walls. Post a blank chart for additional ideas.
- 2. Start by asking mentors the following question: Why is it important to choose just the right college for you? (College will be your home for several years, so it's important to choose just the right one.)
- 3. Tell mentors to think about the perfect environment for them to enjoy carring and living. The a give each mentor a different colored marker or set of stickers, and have them many their preferences on each posted chart. Have them write additional preferences on the blank chart.
- 4. Talk about the results. What do you notice about everyone's preferences? Why might, ome mentors prefer to go to a local college while others prefer to go out of state?
- 5. Have mentors write their own preferences in their not book for futree reference, to help them narrow their choices of colleges later in their search for the perfect college match.



College Views

Have mentors go only enview college video tours or college recruitment videos, such as at www.younive sity v.com/latest-college-videos, or provide a collection of videos for them to view.

Have me tors rank each video from 1 to 10 depending on how close a match it is to their college preferences.

Then have mentors tell as out and give reasons for their favorites. Which mentors choose the same videos and why?



Activity MORE COLLEGE OPTIONS

College Abroad?

Ask mentors if they have ever considered "studying abroad" – going to another country for some or all of their college education. Brainstorm reasons for and against studying abroad.

Reasons to Study Abroad

- travel around and see the world first-hand
- experience another culture first-hand
- learn and practice the language of that country
- make friends around the world
- develop global skills and experiences
- develop multicultural skills and experiences
- explore international internships
- learn about yourself and your own heritage
- learn to solve diverse problems and situations
- enhance your future employment opportunities

Does it cost more to study abroad? Many local universities have a Study A broad Program, in which their students can attend school in another country while still puying the regular to ition of that local university. The partnering schools usually exchange students, providing opportunities for students in both places to study in a foreign country. Some programs also include room and board with students living an empus or with a host family.

Have mentors check favorite colleges a see what opportulities are available for studying abroad. Mentors might also do online research about the culture and lifestyle of pose favorite places.

Sharing College Knowledge

As a club, share called knowledge with peers by creating an interactive map or other type of dynamic display, and/or creating a college 'nowledge' by g or your own videos, for peers to explore college options. Encourage peers to submit their own questions, exchange information, and rank preferences.
